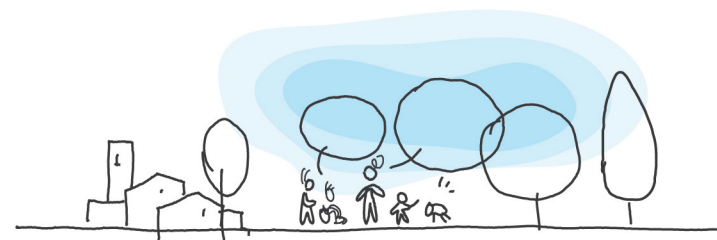

Transforming Pella's Central Administration Building into a Near-Zero Energy Landmark with the New European Bauhaus principles

The Municipality of Pella is preparing an investment plan for the energy and functional upgrade of its Central Administrative Building (Town Hall), aiming to transform it into a nearly Zero Energy Building (nZEB). The project will serve as a pilot example of implementing the principles of the New European Bauhaus (sustainability – aesthetics – inclusion) in a public administrative building.



The investment plan is being developed with the support of the European City Facility (EUCF), which is co-funded by the European Union through the LIFE Programme.



Aesthetics and Spatial Experience: Architectural elements enhance both visual appeal and user experience, creating a pleasant public environment.



Inclusion: Local stakeholders actively participate in the process to ensure that the space is welcoming and responsive to the diverse needs of the community.



Sustainability: Eco-friendly materials are used and energy-efficient interventions are implemented to reduce the environmental footprint of the building.

Main Objective:

To develop a model framework for a public administration facility that promotes:

- energy efficiency within the climatic zone of Northern Greece
- the principles of the "New European Bauhaus" initiative.



The improvement of working conditions will be achieved through the optimization of indoor climate, lighting, and energy systems. At the same time, the upgraded building will operate as a "living lab" for citizens, students, and professionals, making the benefits of energy renovation visible in everyday life and fostering behavioral change towards more responsible and environmentally friendly practices.
